

**MINUTES OF THE CITY COUNCIL
SHEFFIELD LAKE, OHIO
April 14, 2026**

This regular meeting of the City Council was held Tuesday, April 14, 2026.
Council President Rosso called the meeting to order at 7:01 pm.

READING OF THE MINUTES:

Council - *Motion by Gee/Second by Cizl to accept the minutes of the March 24, 2026 meeting with any noted corrections. Yeas all.

CORRESPONDENCE: Monthly report of court receipts for March 2026- \$3,651.82. Liquor License for Manya and Pray LLC. *Motion by Morrow/Second by Kovach for no hearing. Yeas All.

PRESENTATIONS: Submission of Shannon Morgan for position of member of the Park Board. *Motion by Gee/Second by Kovach to accept the appointment. **ROLL CALL:**

Petrucci, Kovach, Fogel, Morrow, Cizl, DeBottis, Gee. Yeas All.

Victor Edwards/TCI: Mr. Edwards states I came before you and we discussed and deliberated on different aspects of the audio video recording system, streaming system. Based on the comments that we had, I went back and I revised the proposal for version three. We reduced some things, we added some things, and I believe currently the proposal is sitting at \$13,447. Councilman Morrow asks this includes microphones? Mr. Edwards replies it does. Councilman Fogel says I asked him if we could add a cordless microphone at some point, because I know yesterday at the town hall, there were some people in the back that the microphone didn't pick up. I know that we had a handicapped gentleman here that had a hard time getting up to the podium. He did say yes, we could easily add a cordless microphone. Mr. Edwards states a wireless microphone costs maybe around \$200. The Behringer mixer that's selected for the proposal, it has 16 XLR inputs, which is approaching the exact number of microphones you have. There are auxiliary inputs that I think would work with that. Aden had also mentioned that we don't necessarily use all these, so we may be able to free up the channels if need be. Councilman Cizl asks as far as the production, the video production of our meetings, obviously right now we're switching between multiple cameras. How do you plan to actually produce the video aspect? Mr. Edwards responds the intent was to have it where it was essentially complete and automatic, where using a 4K video, you would have three 1080p cameras that are nested inside the same frame, picture in picture. Those three cameras would just be live the entire duration of the meeting. So, you wouldn't need to switch between them. We did also add in the version three proposal, a Samsung tablet. The reason for that tablet is you can connect that tablet as a remote control to the video broadcasting PC. So, then the council president or clerk would be able to change

the scenes wirelessly using that control interface without having to have someone sit back in the corner of the room and do that. I would see that more or less if you wanted to have a presentation and you want to put HDMI video from a laptop up on the TV or onto the YouTube channel, more than switching between the actual cameras themselves. Councilman Morrow asks we would still be recording a hard copy that theoretically if something went wrong with the live feed, that that could be corrected post-production. Mr. Edwards replies that's correct. When I set up the streaming software, I will have it automatically record and stream at the same time. So, even if the building loses internet connectivity or there's an issue with the YouTube platform, there'll be an MP4 file, a video file on the hard drive on the computer. The intention is to automatically back that up to one of the city's network hard drives. So, that way if there was an issue with the computer, you have copies of those videos elsewhere. Councilman Morrow says if someone wanted to take the three different views and then make their own video by cutting and splicing them together, they could do that as well, rather than just looking at it as three separate views. Mr. Edwards replies that is possible. It would obviously require some video editing, some expertise. But just to clarify, this system does not record each camera independently. It records the aggregate, like the scene compilation of all three at the same time. But if you were skilled, you could cut that out. President Rosso says we went through three presentations and I guess I'm looking for some direction. Do we want to make a decision tonight or do you want to go over it in work session? I'm hoping that we come up with a decision within the next week or so that says we want to move forward with this and get the process rolling, which would require legislation that we would have to pass. Law Director Ward says I can have a proposed ordinance drafted before the work session and council can consider the ordinance, but I don't think there should be any official councilmanic action this evening. President Rosso replies I guess what I was just asking, is everybody okay with if we have the law director make the legislation up that you guys' review in work session? If you are okay with it, we'll move it on to council. Councilwoman Gee asks the finance director, you've seen all of this? Finance Director Rummell replies I actually have not seen the third version. Councilwoman Gee says okay, if Brandy could get our finance director a copy of what he's talking about, could you review it and let us know before work session if we can afford this or not? Finance Director Rummell replies yes. Councilman Fogel says I just wanted to say that we got three bids. Victor came in about \$20,000 lower than the second lowest bid. The highest bid, he was \$30,000 under, maybe a little less. So, for the same equipment, if not better. With the fixed camera system, that will eliminate the need for a videographer, which will save the city at least \$1,200 a year and we won't be storing at Vimeo anymore. I think that's like \$250 a year. So, at least \$1,450 a year of savings. Councilman DeBottis asks I apologize if this is a disrespectful question, but are you licensed, bonded, and insured? Mr. Edwards replies this is all a low voltage application. To my knowledge, the State of Ohio does not require a license to install low voltage equipment. As far as insurance, yes and I can provide you the certificate of insurance. As far as bonding, I can get you a bond if you require it, but I think that the cost of the project scope wouldn't warrant a bond. If it makes you feel more comfortable, I can do that. Councilwoman Gee asks for the audience that hasn't been here and seen the paperwork, could you tell them who else you do this for in Lorain County? Mr. Edwards responds I work for the Lorain County Commissioner's Office as a contractor and bi-weekly, I do their live streaming for their YouTube channels. I also install other audio and

video streaming systems throughout the county for Amherst Township, St. Joseph in Amherst, St. Peter Church in Lorain, Nativity in Lorain, St. Sacred Heart in Oberlin and St. Patrick in Wellington. I've been in business for about 12 years now. I just actually had a meeting with the Village of South Amherst last week, and they're interested in a very similar setup that we're discussing here. Councilman Cizl asks if any of us wanted to go look at a similar setup, not the hardware aspect, actually going on YouTube and seeing the three cameras shot, is there a local area that we could look at? Just to compare our finished product. Mr. Edwards replies there was an email that I sent. If you were to search for the Lorain County Commissioners on YouTube, and pull up those media videos, or Amherst Township, or St. Peter's, or St. Joseph, you can see the content. St. Joseph is a full 4K, including the cameras. Councilman Cizl says I looked at them. What I'm kind of curious about is the ability to be able to Zoom. I looked at County Commissioner, and you just see a whole room of people. And when you're looking at it, you really don't right away see who's talking. You have to search. So, I just wondered, is there, in your finding, when you're setting things up, are you able to set up the cameras? Is it just going to be a global shot of three different angles? Or is there ability of those 4K cameras to be able to actually Zoom into an area? Mr. Edwards responds the cameras are 1080p, and they do have the ability to electronically zoom in and out, but my intention was to frame the shot, and then leave it stationary. They do not have PTZ, meaning hand tilt functionality. So, there's no joystick involved. If you wanted to do that, it would have been several thousand dollars more to upgrade to that style of camera. I think the intention was to have a system that was basically just push a button and it starts. The cameras are 1080p, but the video stream and the video file will be 4K. That does give you the ability on your smartphone to pinch and zoom. So, you can actually zoom in, and it will still maintain a high fidelity. Councilman Morrow says this is more about for us about the equipment that we will no longer be using, whether or not we look at trading it in or using it somewhere else within the city. So, I mean, these have value what we have right now. Mr. Edwards replies the microphones don't really go obsolete. So, certainly those have some value, but this video equipment is far beyond its useful lifespan. It's standard definition equipment. Honestly, it should just get recycled. There's no resale value, in my opinion. President Rosso says when we get rid of assets in the other departments, like the service department or the fire or police, they bring an ordinance to council that we authorize getting rid of it. If somebody buys it, they buy it. If they don't, after a certain period of time, we throw it away.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS

MAYOR/SAFETY: Mayor Radeff is excused. **/SERVICE DIRECTOR'S REPORT:**

Service Director Hastings reports we have had some unplanned events in the service department, excavating and repairing storm sewers. I will be returning the crews back to asphalt pothole repairs starting tomorrow and happy to report that the asphalt plant has started production so the patches will be more permanent. Our crews are also cleaning storm and sanitary sewers throughout the city and our parks have started cutting grass and finishing up the resident gardens. I do have some legislation that the law director may expound on, but briefly, a lot of it's routine, one being the ODOT SALT contract where I'm seeking suspension of the rules so that I can apply for and get in the consortium. A second is a resolution for bidding out LOR-MR-2461, which is our sidewalk project on Walker, as well as filling the gaps on Lake Breeze. Again, asking for a suspension of the rules as I'm trying to coordinate the completion of Columbia Gas in that area and then us ramping up with this project thereafter with OPWC and the repaving of Walker Rd. and in that same area, also the construction of the splash pad this summer. Finally, I don't know if it's even on the agenda or if it will be considered to be added, is Council #21, which is, again, routine, our annual bid, which we use to solicit for premium no-lead gasoline, diesel fuel, limestone, various sizes, asphalt placement for all or part of the 2026 road sections. I'll be sharing that tomorrow. I'm doing final calculations, as well as sidewalk installation on the escrow. I can tell you that the streets we are looking at, in addition to our bigger projects through OPWC on Walker Rd., West Dr., and now East Dr. through an additional grant, we would add 10 more, including the 800 block of Alameda, 800 block of Maplewood, 600 block of Pasadena, Walker Rd. from Abbe to Maple, Richelieu between Maple and Buckeye, Saddlewood, 900 block of Roberts, Madison off of Irving, the dead end of Kenilworth, and the dead end of Hollywood. Councilman Morrow asks is there any of those that you mentioned there for 8-foot-wide sidewalks? Service Director Hastings replies no, they are sidewalks, but they are on Walker in front of Guenther Park. *Motion by Gee/Second by Cizl to accept the report. Yeas All.

/FINANCE DIRECTORS REPORT: Finance Director Rummell reports in front of you this evening, I have two ordinances. One is council #15, which I'm actually gonna ask you to disregard. This evening, I found an error on it, so I will actually get you a corrected version for the next meeting, so we can completely disregard 15 for now. The other one is council #19. Council #19 is an ordinance for the mayor to enter into an agreement to purchase the new fire truck. So, the fire chief had selected the fire truck, and I think everybody got the specs on that at an earlier point. So, in hearing back from the banks, the best option that we determined was a 7 year at 4.54% interest. Over the course of the 7 years, that would be the \$1,183,747. So, I would appreciate if we could add that to the agenda for this evening. Then at the finance meeting next week, I will be talking about the audit. We did get audit results back, so I would like to use that time to speak a little bit more about the audit findings and answer any questions you may have on that.*Motion by Gee/Second by Cizl to accept the report. Yeas All.

/LAW DIRECTORS REPORT: Law Director Ward reports I would ask any member of council to move to enter into executive session pursuant to Ohio Revised Code, section 121.22 (G)1, for purposes of discussing the council clerk position with the City of Sheffield Lake. The other item I have for my report is that the law dept. continues to

work with the police chief to prepare a draft ordinance relating to e-bikes, which I expect will be completed for initial consideration at the very latest by the ordinance committee meeting at the beginning of May. Lastly, just for clarification, I know there have been a lot of council legislation numbers thrown around this evening. Just for clarity, there are 4 pieces of legislation, numbers 18, 19, 20, and 21. 18, 19, and 20 were circulated on Friday via email. Matter #21 was submitted yesterday by the service director. Those are the items or the item numbers, rather, that need to be added to the agenda if council is so inclined.

CITIZENS COMMENTARY: *Dennis Bring, 5389 Lake Rd.* says I think one of the most precious things we have in our lives are our children. We're very protective of that at a young age or older age or however that is. I think with Mr. Morrow's posting of the children on the internet, Facebook was a very poor choice at best. With that being said, Mr. Morrow did not create the problem. The mayor created the problem. He solicited children to take surveys at school. He not only put the children in harm's way, he put the teachers in harm's way, he put the principal in harm's way. They had a lengthy discussion and investigation about this after this all happened. He did not even entertain the fact of apologizing why he (Morrow) sat there and took all the heat, which I thought was absolutely concerning. He solicited these children, and several of them were not even in our district. He solicited also our rec director. He lives in the village. I don't know if this was a county-wide one or is this supposed to be the city? I don't know what his intention was, but I got a good idea that his numbers weren't up to where they wanted to be. So, he solicited 80-some children to get his numbers up for the survey, which I think is pathetic. He is supposed to be a prosecutor in Lorain. You would think, as being a prosecutor, he would have had enough knowledge to know that these children would have been in harm's way, because it's public record. Was the choice that Mr. Morrow made good? No, I strictly condemn what he did. I don't like it. That's not something we should put our children in with. But again, the mayor sat there the whole time, did not even peep up, and what he should have done is said, look, I made a huge mistake, I apologize. He has yet to do that. He has yet to apologize to the parents. He has not apologized to the school. He has not apologized to you. He has not apologized to anybody. They have called for his (Morrow) resignation. I think the person who should resign is the mayor for what he did. I think that was pathetic on his part, and I think that his decisions, if he can't even decide what to do on a small scale, we should not let him be in charge of this city. That's all I have, except for one more thing. I wanted to thank Brandy, because she worked with me and everything else, and worked with you guys, this is not our last meeting, but I get a little emotional. Thank you.

Jennifer Diaz, 512 Treadway Blvd. states First, I want to comment on the cameras. My recommendation for the cameras would be, make them so they cannot be edited in any way, shape, or form. That is what we do in the state sector. So, if anybody does pull the video, they can't modify it. My second comment is directly to Mr. Morrow. Mr. Morrow, I understand you are so much into public records requests. Well, I looked into you, and I found some interesting information. I have two sources from Rutgers University. Both claim you've never been a student there, even though you claim to have received your master's degree. With that being said, I know you don't have to answer me, but have you ever received a master's degree from Rutgers? Secondly, I believe it was Ms. Gascoyne at the last

meeting had indicated that Mr. Morrow was a Marine. As a family, my husband's military, both my brother-in-law's are Marines, and you had made a comment on the field house. So, I had asked you and gave you a little bit of empathy, because at one point you called me a moron, which, whatever. But I gave you a little bit of leniency, and then people were coming at me, telling me I was foolish, because you, sir, were not a Marine. So, I reached out to you on the side and asked you directly whether you were in fact a Marine, because people were calling me a fool, and you chose not to answer me. So, I do have a request out to the archives for your DD-214 and for any information of your service, because you had an opportunity to correct the minutes that clearly state that you were a Marine. If you're a Marine, thank you for your service, but if you are not a Marine, please let us know, because as a military family, we take you as part of our family, and when somebody poses to be somebody in the military and they're not, that is wrong. That is wrong. So, with that being said, if you truly are a Marine, we have a Hometown Heroes program. I am willing to pay \$145 for you to get your banner up on Lake Rd. All I would need from you is your DD-214 application and a photo of you in your Marine service. That's all I have to say.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: *Motion by Gee/Second by Kovach to amend the agenda to include council numbers 18, 19, 20 and 21. ROLL CALL: Petrucci, Kovach, Fogel, Cizl, DeBottis, Gee. Nays-Morrow.

NEW BUSINESS: Councilman Morrow says I wanted to say that for the field house, I have not seen any type of a feasibility study or an economic feasibility study. I would like to see that, but also, I'd like to see about maybe the finance director and the service director working together to provide an economic model so that we can put in various different inputs to see whether or not to be able to run different models to be able to see whether or not it's something that the city can afford or not afford. Finance Director Rummell replies absolutely. Service Director Hastings says Mr. President; I might need a lesson in government. Do we work for a single request or isn't it a collective council that asks? I'll be honest with you, Councilman, I was a little nervous to answer your email, given the fact that the mayor had requested that you copy him and you didn't. I don't wanna put myself in a precarious position, nor do I wanna do wrong when I'm asked singularly. President Rosso says the directors, the service director, finance director, law director report to the mayor. The sheer fact that I was just letting it go was because Mr. Rummell said, okay, I'll take care of that. If you have concerns and you need to, based on your schedule and workload, talk with the mayor to prioritize, please do that. But you're not walking out of here with a directive that you have to have something done in a certain amount of time. Service Director Hastings replies I don't mind doing the work. It's just a precarious position, given the language that's used in these emails. President Rosso responds I'm not privy to any of the, well, I didn't see any of the emails. So, I'm just saying he made a motion to see if you and the finance director could put together a model to help them understand the finance. I will say this, I'm not even sure we have all the numbers yet. So, I don't know if we're putting the cart before the horse, but whatever. Service Director Hastings states I did a feasibility before we even applied for the grant. Just to remind the council, the intention of the city and the grant that I wrote and we were awarded was for the infrastructure, for the site preparation. And the idea that my presentation was not met with enthusiasm, we backed off with the idea that we can certainly

get more grants if we ever wanna build this thing. But we certainly can move towards the infrastructure improvement, which is approved through the state. I'll probably present that at the next council meeting, because that grant's gonna have to be turned back in. October 14th, I did get preliminary numbers and I was made fun of that as well on the internet. So, I'm just a little apprehensive. I'm not gonna spin my wheels for the city. President Rosso says I understand. If you want to talk with the finance director and the mayor and get a collective agreement position, feel free to do that. Like I said, you're not walking out of here with a to-do that has to be done right away.

Councilman Kovach says there is no such thing as a slightly used fire truck.
